III. Welcome

Chair Jeffrey welcomed the attendees and opened the floor for introductions.

IV. Approval of Agenda

VI. Presentation- Target Zero- Amy Whitfield, Special Director, NMDOT

- New Mexico has the <u>highest rate</u> of pedestrian fatalities in the nation, according to the Governor's Highway Safety Association, with 99 pedestrians killed in 2023 alone. Third consecutive year we've held this top ranking.
- <u>3rd in the nation</u> for crash fatalities according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration's Fatality Analysis Reporting System.
- Forbes Advisor Study ranked New Mexico as the state with <u>the worst drivers</u> in January 2025.
- Most dangerous state to drive in by Everly Life Road Safety Index Report.
- Ranked <u>38th in the Nation</u> in Highway Performance and Cost-Effectiveness by Reason Foundation.

Target Zero is a transformative initiative that will coordinate all the transportation safety work currently underway and sharpen the department's focus on safety in all our work. Target Zero visions a transportation system where every journey is completed safely, with zero driving-related deaths.

Key Principles of Target Zero in New Mexico

- Safety and Human Life First: NMDOT's efforts under Target Zero prioritize the safety and well-being of individuals using New Mexico's transportation system.
- Data-Driven Approach: Target Zero in New Mexico relies on accurate data, analysis, and the strategies outlined in the Target Zero 2050 Implementation Plan to identify risks, implement effective measures, and track progress toward the zero-fatality goal.
- Equity: Ensuring that safety improvements benefit all communities across New Mexico, with a focus on historically underserved or high-risk areas and road users, is a central tenet of Target Zero.
- Accountability: NMDOT, along with other stakeholders, is accountable for their roles in implementing Target Zero strategies and creating safer roadways throughout the state.

Questions:

Felicty Fonseca asked is anyone in the NERTPO region should be aware of hotspots? Amy Whitfield answered, Yes, but obviously the big ones are in Albuquerque and Santa Fe area.

Shawn Jeffrey asked, When asking for entrances moved, is this something NMDOT is paying for? Ms Whitfield answered that NMDOT Road Safety Audits will be paid for. Patrick Million asked, if we hear there is a problem intersection should we tell you Ms Whitfield replied with yes, but there are other ways to get a Road Safety audit.

VII. Presentation - Vijay Ummadi, Rural Transit Program Manager, NMDOT

Vijay Ummadi of NMDOT began a brief set of announcements. He reminded the group that involvement in the RTPO and its rating and ranking process are crucial to the development of regional projects. This gives the public the opportunity to see what is being done locally and share their input and potentially collaborate.

NMDOT announced its FY26 federal transit grant awards on May 28th, 2025. These results are available on the transit and rail section of the Transit Bureau website. These funds are available for the FY26 fiscal year October 1st, 2025 – September 30th, 2026.

The 5310 Transportation project category includes projects that provide enhanced mobility for seniors and the differently abled.

5311 projects assist with admin and operating expenses of rural transit projects.

The transportation project criteria being examined by NMDOT include:


- o Ridership
- Total admin cost
- o Cost per passenger
- o Cost per mile
- o Rating and ranking
- o Percent award expenditure


The committee examines these three elements in a transportation project presentation:

- Level of marketing of transit system


VIII. Presentation- FY26 Transit Rating and Ranking

Golden Spread- 5310 & 53115310





Questions: Shawn Jeffrey asked what are you wanting to purchase? Eva Lawrence said they were wanting smaller vans which are better on gas and better for wheelchairs.



The discussion was brought up about expanding more into Mora County.

Dreamtree-

The Dreamtree Project from Taos gave a presentation on their transit ask. They were not a part of the rating and ranking for NERTPO but they presented as their service affected the NERTPO region:

Dream Tree 5310 Project

Thomas Anderson of Dream Tree Project presented their FY2027 Application for their Vehicle Expansion 5310 Project. The presentation covered the following:

- Their primary focus is transit support for young adults in transitional living programs
- This is a 24/7 on-demand transportation service
- Their transit service saw 5,845 trips taken throughout 2024. They would like this number to quadruple in the coming years
- Many who use these services have experience childhood trauma, developmental disabilities, etc.
- Homelessness rates in Northern NM are substantially higher than the National average

 Dream Tree has housing for young adults across Rio Arriba, Taos, Colfax and San Miguel counties

• Dream Tree coordinates transportation through existing providers

• It provides connections to other transit modes (Blue Bus, Santa Fe Trails, Rail Runner, etc.)

• In addition to transportation, some riders receive one-on-one accompaniment

- Issues to be addressed by 5310 Funding:
 - O Some vital services lie outside of transit coverage
 - O Minors may not right the buses alone
 - o Medicaid accepting facilities are often too far a journey
- Dream Tree is looking to expand to Española, Raton and Las Vegas
- Funding will go towards three AWD SUV's
- Approach ensures flexibility and accessibility across the region
- Transportation should feel supportive and non-institutional
- Requested Federal amount: \$120,000 Local Match: \$30,000

Julie Surina thanked everyone for their presentations. She mentioned the Transportation and Paving Conference January 6-8. Also mentioned that Transportation Day is January 29th during the Legislative session and urged members to talk to their legislators about road funds. Patrick Million reminded members of the Trails+ and Outdoor Equity opportunities with ORD. He echoed the announcement of the Paving Conference and also announced an opportunity with GEICO.
